

Andrea del Boca – Biography

Andrea del Boca, born on October 18, 1965, in Buenos Aires, Argentina, is one of the most iconic Argentine actresses and singers, widely recognized for her leading roles in telenovelas throughout the 1980s and 1990s. Her performances captivated audiences across Latin America and beyond, establishing her as a beloved figure in international entertainment.

She began her acting career at the age of four in the television series *Nuestra galleguita*, portraying a deaf-mute child. In 1970, she appeared in the series *Alta comedia*, earning the prestigious **Martín Fierro Award** for Best Newcomer in 1971. Her fame soared in 1973 when she played the role of the orphan Pinina in the hit telenovela *Papá corazón*, aired on Canal 13.

Throughout the years, she starred in a number of popular telenovelas that solidified her status as a television icon, including:

- *Andrea Celeste* (1979–1980)
- *Estrellita mía* (1987)
- *Celeste* (1991)
- *Antonella* (1992)

In addition to her acting career, Andrea del Boca pursued a successful path in music. She released several albums, such as *Con amor* (1988) and *Te amo* (1989), with many of her songs featured as soundtracks for her telenovelas.

In the 1990s, she continued to shine in series like *Perla negra* (1994) and *Zíngara* (1996), while also appearing in films such as *Funes, un gran amor* (1993) and *Peperina* (1995).

In 2000, she returned to cinema with the romantic comedy *Apariencias*, and between 2001 and 2002, she played the leading role in the TV series *El sodero de mi vida*, for which she won her **second Martín Fierro Award**, this time for Best Actress in a Comedy Series.

In the following years, Andrea del Boca continued to work across television, theater, and music. She starred in projects such as:

- *Sálvame María* (2005)
- *Alguien que me quiera* (2010)
- the stage play *Eva y Victoria* (2011), portraying Eva Perón.

Known for her charisma, emotional depth, and strong screen presence, Andrea del Boca is a beloved figure in Latin American pop culture. With a career spanning over five decades, she remains an enduring symbol of talent, passion, and artistic legacy.
